8	An amendment toe New Mexico House Bill 5 section fourteen that delineates the eligibility		
9	of a school to receive the small school adjustment fund. This amendment seeks to expand		
10	the eligibility requirements based on the term rural rather than on unit numbers in hopes of		
11	bringing much-needed financial aid t the small communities of New Mexico.

SECTION 1. As stated in section fourteen, page twenty-five, line twelve of
House Bill 5, "An approved public school, including a charter school, with a MEM of
fewer than four hundred that is geographically located in a school district with
fewer than two thousand MEM, is eligible for additional program units." This section
intended to supply financial support to rural communities, outlines the size of a rura
community that is eligible to receive money from the small school adjustment fund.
However, this limitation does not meet the same quota requirements that designates
a community as rural defined by the National Census Bureau. According to a report
report issued in December of 2016 by U.S. Census Bureau " the Census Bureau
began implementing criteria, through a uniform set of objective rules, which
consistently define urbanized areas with a population of 50,000 or more." Areas with
smaller population or population density are considered to be rural. In the essence
of this definition, it is asked that the max MEM be raised to at 3,000 to accommodate
the technically rural schools that will no longer be able to remain open without this
vital funding. As this new limit was enacted in the spring 2019 legislative session
and funding that was previously supplied to 93 schools will decrease tenfold. By
raising the cap to 3,000 it saves about seven schools that are vital in ensuring a
quality education to those in less fortunate, impoverished areas in New Mexico.
These seven school will hardly make a dent in the overall budget for they were
funded Year's prior, however, keeping their doors open will leave a lasting impact or
these rural communities. By ensuring a quality education to the youth of New
Mexico, the representatives ensure a brighter future for all of New Mexico.

SECTION 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date that may be called for that purpose.
